President's Message

Can you believe it! We are already into the summer months and our annual members' picnic is a few weeks away. I hope you are planning to attend. We have some new things coming our way and we hope to have your input on some of them.

As I mentioned earlier this year the Board of Directors are looking at ways to save money so we can support efforts to keeping our public lands open to all users. As you can see from the heading in this newsletter, we are going to one newsletter every two months. By doing this we can cut our newsletter costs by approximately 45% or roughly \$300.00. You ask, what is the need to save money?

The club operates on a balancing budget dictated by membership dues and fundraisers. In the past, our fundraiser comes during the Members' Appreciation Banquet. We distribute the monies raised during the raffles to a local charity and it helps pay for the Valentines and Mothers' Day appreciation drawings.

Membership dues pay for our membership dues with the Idaho State ATV Association, and Blue Ribbon Coalition. We also support the Blue Ribbon Legal Defense Fund and send monies to Idaho Recreation Council. Historically, we donate monies to the MSTI Foundation for transportation needs, the Area Quick Response Organization, and the Southern Idaho Off Road Association North Rim Park

Clean Up. In addition, the membership dues pay for the summer picnic, appreciation banquet, treats for the June work weekend, and lunch at the September National Public Lands Day work weekend.



The Safe Kids of Magic Valley is a proactive organization, which presents several programs throughout the year aimed at keeping our kids safe. Their programs range from child safety restraints to farm safety and many others. This year Safe Kids of Magic Valley included our club at two Ag Safety Day activities. The community support and appreciation to the club is invaluable. At this year's summer picnic, we are going to do a 50/50 Raffle with half of

the money raised going to the Safe Kids of Magic Valley earmarked for helmets and other OHV riding gear. As a way for you to help the club give



back to the Safe Kids of Magic Valley, you can buy raffle tickets and enter to win some money for yourself as well as giving back to the community.

By saving monies in the mailing costs, we can keep our membership dues low and fundraisers to a

minimum. Now, what does this give you as a member? At our June Board of Director's meeting, we voted to become a member club in a program used by the South Western Idaho ATV/UTV Clubs. This program will provide you, a member of the MVATVR, more riding opportunities in other areas of the state and the opportunity to meet other OHV enthusiasts. Big Cottonwood Ride Report Friday

Friday morning we arose and prepped our machines. Don Loveland arrived and Kris Larson, Stan and Pat, Don, and I headed out for our exploratory ride. After quick jaunt up Cave Canyon and nearly running over a skunk we crossed the creek on Corral Creek and as we were headed down 148-Dry Flats I got word on the radio that Don had a

flat tire. Don had a slit in his sidewall and fix a flat wouldn't fix it. After changing the tire, Don opted to head back to camp so we got him to Big Cedar Road and continued on our ride without him. We made our way over to 062-Dry Road and found that band of sheep was bedded down. After trying our best to follow the road, we eventually made our way to 140-Harrington North and found a wild turkey wandering around at our lunch spot.

After lunch we headed down 056-East Line Spring West and realized that the end of the road didn't offer the view I was hoping for so we turned back. We made our way to 532-First Fork and found that the snow drift that was blocking it was still too big to go up after Kris tried multiple times to power his way up it. We also found that the drifts on 170-Corral Road were passable with a bit of power and speed! We cruised through Bostetter Campground and continued on our expedition.

We found that 161-Chicken Spring road was passable at long last. We made our way down 528-Big Cedar and hit 082-Robber Peak and looked for my knife I lost a couple weeks previous. Kris found it laying in the road after I had given up. We made it to camp after going down Cave Canyon and concluded our 72-mile expeditionary ride at 5:16 p.m. We spend 5 hours on the move and just shy of 3 hours enjoying the sites. The temperature for the ride was varied between 60 and 70 degrees and with the preceding nights rain was a fairly dust free day!

Saturday

Saturday morning we had 17 people riding 11 machines. When we left camp it was already 88 degrees. We headed up Big Cedar road and then down Buck Horn road. We went down 185-

Buckhorn Spur A and saw the trees and a beaver dam in this part of the forest. We left the forest and were now on BLM land. We left Amy at a junction and the rest of us headed down a steep and rutted road to overlook of the Burley



and Oakley valley as well as a view of Buckhorn road. After viewing the sites, we headed back on a loop that was a very little used road that was mostly covered with grass and flat rock that offered a view of the Murtaugh valley. We picked up Amy at her rest spot and headed down Mike's Cabin road into

the valley. We cut across to the west on another BLM road that also gets very little use.

We connected to 167-Medley Creek where Marvin Barnes recorded the group as they dropped into the ravine. We headed back south on a climbing grade that offered a nice view of the creek and rock faces. We eventually connected back to Buckhorn road where most of the group headed down 074-Stump Creek and Amy headed down the road for a rest stop. We stopped for a few minutes to overlook the East Fork Dry Creek at the base of the canyon. We picked Amy back up on Buckhorn and headed to Basin Patch. We stopped at Basin Patch as 12:14 a.m. which was only 2 minutes later than my estimate! After 40 minutes of visiting and eating, we continued on our ride and headed down 065-Horse Hollow where Marvin recorded the group going down a short drop into the valley and crossing Coat Pit Creek (I hit it with a bit of speed for effect!). We passed the sheep camp and went down the "lost road" otherwise known as 062-Dry Road. No one got lost (Amy skipped this part of the ride and we picked her up at Dry Creek Road).



We made our way over to 145-Harrington North loop and left Amy, Jerry, and Stan and Pat while the group made our way down the loop and then went to about half way down 056-East Line Spring where we enjoyed a beautiful view of Rock Creek Road just North of the Third Fork Trailhead which was blocked from our view. Also slightly blocked from our view by the trees was the Steer Basin Campground. After everyone enjoyed the view, we headed back to pick everyone who took a nap break. There, everyone took a short break in the trees.

We headed out and went down 142-Fuller Peak. We passed two gentleman that were cutting wood that told me that a tree was blocking the road

down the trail but could simply be winched out of the road. After doing so, we then hit about 5 huge trees blocking the road again. I advised the group that we should turn around. A few people with chain saws said they could make quick work of the trees. Not wanting to hurt their feelings, since I knew they carried them for such emergencies, I said OK. After 30 minutes cutting trees out of 3 more spots, we put the saws away and continued on our journey.

We passed the beaver dams on Big Cedar road where several people saw some moose. We made our way down 147-Lodgepole Road where we sent Marvin ahead to record everyone crossing the creek and stopped at the cabin at the road junction only 45 minutes past my estimate thanks to our service project. We headed out and went down 812-Cave Canyon to our next official stop overlooking Big Cottonwood Creek. After enjoying the sights, we headed down the trail and experienced rocks, narrow overgrown sections, and a spot down in the flat part of the trail where the moisture has turned the trail into a muddy mess.

We arrived at our starting point at 5:15 (30 minutes late) after traveling 67 miles at a 13.7 mph average speed. We spent nearly 5 hours on the move and 3 hours enjoying the sites. Temperatures ranged from a low of 66 to a high of 85. After everyone departed, Kris, Amy, Stan, Pat, and I enjoyed the rest of the evening sitting in our lawn chairs.

Sunday

Sunday morning we arose and packed our lunch and waited for riders to show up. As promised, Bill Mefford pulled in and unloaded his machine. All told, we had 5 machines and 6 people for Sunday's ride. When we left it was already 93 degrees according to the temperature sensor on my GPS.

With riders in tow, we headed up Big Cedar road, jumped onto Cave Canyon and made our way to the cabin and the creek crossing previously mentioned. We took a short break and photo shoot at the Sawmill Creek motorcycle trail bridge and then continued on our way. We hit the 152-Sawmill Creek loop and found that the large snow drift on the southern end of 528A-Big Cedar Spur A was still there, but unlike earlier in the week it was passable.

After waiting for everyone to catch up, Bill and I went back and forth over the drift. I lost track of how many times Bill had fun crossing it, but my GPS showed I went across 5 times. Amy had a big smile on her face as she crossed and so did Kris. Stan was the only one who didn't make it across the drift. He blamed a lack of speed, or some other small reason for bypassing the drift....



At the next drift we encountered, on Dry Creek Road, Bill and I were doing some more playing around when Amy came up and said that Kris was having technical difficulties. We headed back a bit and found that Kris blew the belt on his RZR to shreds. We think he wore it out on Fridays trip when we were playing in the snow. After about a half an hour the belt was replaced and we were on the way again.

We headed down the 155 Ecklund Creek loop and found that all the drifts that were there on Monday were gone, much to Bills disappointment. We hit 159-Cabin Spring road, 158-White Stump Creek, and 161-Chicken Spring roads and didn't encounter any drifts of note. We made a quick cruise through Father and Sons campground since Bill had never been there before and then headed to the large MVUM sign just east of Bostetter Campground where we had lunch by the creek. After lunch we wandered around the ranger station a bit and then headed out.

If you haven't figured it out yet, playing in the snow and blowing up a belt blew my schedule out of the water, and since we had only a few riders, we left Amy at the Oakley Rogerson\Bostetter Loop junction and the rest of us went to the FS Spring\Trapper Creek junction to play in the snow drifts. Again, to our disappointment, the drifts were gone so we headed back and went to the Martindale

junction where the gate is and found that the drifts there were also gone. We didn't go past the gate due to time, and then headed back to gather up Amy.

We headed down 170-Corral road where we hit our first drift. I made it across pretty easily and the saw a deer. I motioned to Bill about the deer and after looking for it, he headed across the drift and promptly got stuck. After a bit of trying, and still being stuck, Amy offered to let him use her winch and very nicely pulled him out of the drift! Kris and Stan made it across with no problems. Bill said he got stuck because I distracted him with the deer. You, the reader, will have to decide if his excuse is as poor as Stan's was earlier in the day....

We found that the next drift was pretty much gone so we continued down 532-First Fork to the large drift where Kris got stuck on Friday. I made it down the drift just fine. Bill even made it down this one without getting stuck. Amy had a huge smile on her face as she crossed, and even Stan and Pat made it down the drift.

After visiting among ourselves, and not being on a schedule since it was already shot, some of the riders decided to have a bit of fun. Bill was the first to try and go up the drift. He jumped on his machine and punched it, only to get stuck 10 feet from the top. After Kris maneuvered his machine off to the side and Aaron hiked up, we carefully winched Bill free. While we were at the top, Stan studied the terrain, got his smart phone out and punched in a bunch of numbers, fastened his seat belt and punched it. Miraculously, he made it to the top with rooster tails of snow flying through the air! Obviously, he had to prove he wasn't out of gas quite yet given getting stuck on the Big Cedar spur. Aaron made the next attempt, and he made it all the way to the other side with snow flying through the Aaron made three successful attempts in climbing the hill and Bill made several more successful trips as well! After 20 minutes of playing, and leaving some ruts in the snow, we headed out. At the sheep camp we encountered a couple buzzards feasting on a dead ewe with her lamb standing a couple hundred yards away. Hopefully the sheep herder finds the little one.



Our next destination was the 142-Fuller Peak road where we cut all the trees the previous day. Amy skipped out on this loop to rest her thumb, and after discovering no more downed trees, we picked her back up and headed to 065-Horse Hollow. We crossed the creek and headed to Basin Patch Spring where we took a short break. Amy, Stan and Pat where tired, so when we departed they headed back to camp down Big Cedar Road. Bill wasn't tired yet, so I took him down 082-Robber Peak when connects into the Cave Canyon trail.

We are not sure what time the other group made it back to camp, but Bill and I arrived at 4:09 p.m. We traveled 61.3 miles in a total of 7 hours and 8 minutes. We spent 4 hours on the move and 3 hours at rest. Temperatures were between 72 and 85 degrees.

Work and Ride Report

The weather was a little rainy, windy, and cool, however eight campers braved the conditions and camped out at FS Flats for our work detail weekend. Some of these people rode the trails on Friday, to find out what work needed to be done.

On Saturday, 13 members of the Magic Valley ATV Riders met at the F.S. Flats campsite to prepare for our annual trail clearing and maintenance detail.

Due to conditions beyond our control, some of the trail work we had expected to do had not been approved by the forest service yet. Given our low turnout, we divided into three groups. One group of seven members descended on the trail that leads from the Diamondfield Jack parking lot up to Pike Mountain. These members spent several hours trimming the brush and trees from the trail area.

Their work improved the sight line for other users to be able to see around corners and riding conditions.

The second group of six members descended to the junction of Third Fork Canyon and Martindale Canyon. These members worked the trail section that historically sloughs off during the spring thaw. The trail held up reasonably well given the high snow pack and heavy runoff this year. They cleaned up the hillside trough so water could run down the trail and not wash across the trail. They also widened the trail making it safer for all users.



The second group then drove half way up Martindale Canyon where they tackled another section of severe off camber trail. After lots of Pulaski and shovel work, the trail was flattened and widened, making it a safer trail section and not one sloping towards the creek. There were other sections of the Martindale Canyon Trail in need of work but that will be for another day.

The third group of two members rode the Little Fork, Third Fork, and Trail Canyon trails trimming trees and shrubs that had arched and grown into the trail system.

The participating club members spent approximately 65 working hours on trail maintenance this year.

On Saturday night, the club provided cookies for everyone while we sat around the campfire telling tall tales and complaining of sore muscles.

Safety Message

s we venture out his summer, remember other public land users are heading to the trails as well. With the lingering snowpack, washed out trails and roads, user interactions will be higher. Our mission is to work diligently to keep our public lands open to OHV users, both motorized and non-motorized.

When you come across non-motorized users on the trails and roads reduce your speed to minimize the noise and dust. If necessary, pull to the side of the trail or road and stop, allowing the other users to pass by. This usually only takes a few seconds and has a positive impact with the other user group.

In the event you meet persons riding horses or mules pull to the side of the road or trail and stop, turn off your engine, and remove your helmet. To the horse or mule, you are not a natural creature and could startle the animal causing the rider to be bucked off. Greet these folks in a positive manner

and smile, you will feel better and they will have a more positive experience to tell their friends.

We believe in the "Stay on Trails" campaign and encourage everyone to promote and follow this concept. It is very simple, stay on the designated trail or route. I know it easily said, but "what ifs" always come up. Let's discuss some "What ifs." This spring you are riding along and the trail is submerged under water or covered by deep snow. What are our options? We could proceed and see how stable the snow is, look for a way around, start shoveling, or turn around. All are possible options, which one could negatively affect the perception of OHV users? Going around can have a negative impact depending on what it takes to accomplish it. If you can simply drive around and not leave any trace and the distance is very short, that might be an option. If you have to climb over brush or through soft soggy soil, then turning around is the best option.

Trail Difficulty Guide

evel 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate: Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center obstacles. Four-wheel on drive highly recommended.

Level 5 - Expert: high camber, water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.




