Our second one will be a representative from the Forest Service talking about upcoming prescribed burns in the South Hills.

This will also be our last regularly scheduled meeting until October.

Prescribed Burns

Prescribed burns, also known as Rx burns, are controlled applications of fire to fuels confined within a predetermined area, under predefined environmental conditions, whereby fire behavior is managed to meet resource management objectives.

This promotes landscape resiliency by reducing heavy fuel loads and minimizes the potential for severe wildfires in the future. It also creates a safer environment for wildland firefighters responding to future fires in the area and helps maximize their ability to safely and efficiently suppress wildfires. There are many different types of prescribed burns including:

- Broadcast burns burns where fire is applied generally to most or all of the predetermined project area.
- Pile burns ignition of hand or machine piles of cut vegetation that have been allowed to dry out.
- Tree well burns low intensity burns around the base of large trees to gradually reduce the accumulation needles, limbs and other organic debris.

Snake River Canyons Park Cleanup

Saturday, May 18, 2018 we will be working with Sthe Southern Idaho Off Road Association and other folks to clean up trash that has accumulated over the past year. We will be concentrating on the BLM lands leased by Jerome County and is now the Snake River Canyons Park.

Start time is 8:00 AM. It will probably take until early afternoon to finish the projects. Do not feel that you have to stay the whole time; whatever you can do will be appreciated. Pizza will be furnished for lunch at noon.

Drive north of the Perrine Bridge on US 93 to the traffic light at Golf Course Road. At the stop light, turn east towards Devil's Corral and Shoshone Falls. We will be at the first parking area as you turn off Hwy. 93.

All participants must wear long pants, have leather gloves, no open toed shoes, and be over 16 years of age.

Things that have proven valuable during past clean ups include, but not limited to, bucket, shovel, rakes (both leaf and metal), and small tarps.

YES, there is a lot of trash! It is very important that we show the public that we care enough about this area to spend a day cleaning up. This is a very popular OHV use area and the closest riding area to Twin Falls. We will concentrate on the

BLM lands, but still clean the area on Idaho Department of Lands that borders the main access road to the area. The Jerome County Commissioners and BLM personnel will be on hand



to assist. The BLM will furnish garbage bags. Loaders will be on site to load trash into the big dumpsters.

There will be large loaders and dump trucks available. If you have a dump truck that you would

like to bring, that would be great. You can bring your ATV that would be helpful, but is not required. If you have a trailer to pull behind your ATV, that too would be helpful in transporting trash to the loaders. Please plan for any kind of weather. Bring water, sunscreen, and rain gear.

Bring your smile. There is a good possibility the news media will be there so let us have a good turnout. In the past, we have had the most participants and it would be great if it happened again. It is important that we participate to help make this a great OHV open use area, one that all users can enjoy.

Lake Channel Ride Report

The group of 13 machines met up at Ridley's parking lot in Rupert. We had one new couple, Ken and Donna Rodrigues and a guest of Jacob Metcalf, Mark, riding with us.

Trail Difficulty Guide

Evel 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate: Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center on obstacles. Four-wheel drive highly recommended.

Level 5 - Expert: Very rocky, steep, off

camber, high water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.

3. Generator use should be with consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.

4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.
