### Presidents Message

Well, it feels like winter outside and that means by the time you read this we have already had our first real snow fall in the valleys. I want to start this month's message by thanking everyone who submitted comments and attended the open house

meetings sponsored by the Minidoka Ranger District of the Sawtooth National Forest. Access to our public lands is important to all users and especially important to the motorized user. It is disheartening that every effort can be put to close



access to motorized users because a very small number of people complain. These are the same folks who are well aware they are going to recreate in an area that has some of the best motorized trails and roads in the Pacific Northwest. Yet they choose to use motorized trails and demand these trails be closed to the very ones who developed and spend numerous hours ensuring users have access to maintained trails. Every year we hear from public deterioration and managers on the disappearance of trails in non-motorized areas. Idaho has some of the highest numbers of roadless acres in the nation, both designated as wilderness or wilderness study areas. Yet public land managers continue to broaden non-motorized areas.

Recently, the Mountain Home Ranger District of the Boise National Forest opened the

Wilson Creek ATV Trails west of Pine, Idaho. To the dismay of many users the Mountain Home Ranger District is implementing a seasonal closure to a trail network which did not have such designation under the current travel plan. The Ranger District says this is a temporary closure and it will last as long as they deem necessary. The Rally in the Pines posted to their Facebook page a list of rides that will possibly be closed in 2021 when the Salmon-Challis National Forest implements its new forest travel plan in 2021. The recent actions of the Forest Service give the appearance they are developing wilderness areas without legislative action.

Now is the time for motorized users to join forces and be more involved in demanding our motorized access be important and stop catering to the few people who dislike motorized use. I, for one, would hope our public land managers would learn from the devastating fires we have seen in recent years. Areas no longer motorized have made fighting wildland fires more frustrating. I hate to think what would have happened to Ketchum, Idaho if there had not been the roads available to battle the Castle Rock Fire. I know public land managers will disagree with me, but it is hard to argue with the fact that fire fighters have had to watch wildland fires racing across the landscape with no access routes to get ahead of a fire. This can make access slow and dangerous.

Before I close, I want to review some riding etiquette topics. I attended both open house meetings hosted by the Minidoka Ranger District. I listened to public comments and other officials regarding motorized users on public lands. motorized users, we are constantly under scrutiny regarding the way some riders treat our public lands and other users. As a club we believe in promoting safe and responsible ATV/UTV riding. We believe that public lands are to be open and accessible to ALL USERS. As a club we promote the Stay On Trails program and have seen the rewards of following that practice. Unfortunately, we have also witnessed the destruction caused by others who do not. The tax dollars spent to reclaim the land destroyed by these users could have been used to improve existing trails, create new trails systems, and improve or create new trailheads.

Just a reminder regarding trail etiquette. When riding trails and roads be courteous to other users. When approaching or meeting other motorized users slow down and consider a safe place to pull over and stop. Many trails are narrow and passing in opposite directions can be tough. On a few rides, the leader has stopped the group and ridden through a narrow section of trail to insure there is no oncoming traffic. When meeting hikers,

bicycle riders, and equestrians on trails or narrow roads you should stop and turn off your engine. Most of the time these users are small in number and will pass by in a few seconds. If you come up behind any of these users slow down and pass with caution. In most cases, these users will

move off the trail and allow you to pass by. Be patient! We want to avoid conflict and be the courteous ones. If the other user persists to stay on the trail consider stopping and taking a break or taking another route at the next junction. It is upsetting to be riding along and slow down when meeting another motorized user, only to have them blow past you. It is annoying to be dusted and have gravel and sand thrown into the air for you to ride through. Think about this when you ride past a hiker, bicycle rider, or equestrian.

I am proud to be the President of the Magic Valley ATV/UTV Riders and it is a privilege for me to work alongside some great goal-driven individuals. The accomplishments we obtained this year are because you care about our public lands and you want to see it remain open to all users.

Registration stickers are available at most of the OHV dealerships and local DMV offices in your area. You can also renew online through the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation website.



## Cold Springs & Big Cedar Ride Report. Nov 23, 2019

t was a great day for a Fall Ride as seven MVATVR met south of Murtaugh. This staging area is not used much and is a great location for fall and spring riding into the eastern side of the Cassia Division of the Sawtooth National Forest. As we prepared our six machines for the days' adventure it became apparent the cold weather clothing layers might prove to be too much. The forecast called for midtwenties at 10:00 AM, but temperatures were already reaching the mid-thirties and the skies were clear.

The ride took us up the East Dry Creek Road (also known as Cold Spring Road). It was nice to see the precarious gates replaced with cattleguards. The days ride would take us across various BLM and USFS Grazing allotments but given the time of the year, nearly all the gates were open allowing the cattle to begin migrating to the lower elevations. Our first turn came approximately 3 miles into the

ride, where the trail would take us to Medley Creek Canyon and up to the forest service boundary. This trail proved to be fun as we traversed rocky hillsides and dry creek crossings. We rode up Medley Creek (077) and connected with Buckhorn Road (079). We then took off on road 074 towards the East Fork of Dry Creek. This trail runs along the canyon rim and has great views for wildlife and spring flowers. We stopped at one of the better viewpoints and Eagle Eye Dixie spotted what might have been a goodsized deer working its way through the thick brush up the west side. We then began the rocky hill climb back towards Buckhorn Road. Sometimes I wonder if we should put Eagle-Eye Dixie near the leader. Once again, her keen eyesight located a herd of elk making their way up the west side of Dry Creek. We rode up Buckhorn Road (079) to the Big Cedar Road (528). After riding Big Cedar Road a short distance, we turned right towards Horse Hollow and Coal Pit Creek (145 & 065). We rode in some snow that was still lingering in the shadows from previous storms. We crossed Ramshorn Ridge Road (530) and turned onto Old Squaw Road (063) and onto the main Dry Creek Road (527). Starting December 1 until June 1, the main Dry Creek Road is under seasonal closure to motorized travel. Portions of this ride will have to be altered to avoid this road during this time. We rode up Dry Creek Road and turned left onto Coal Pit Creek road (142). We arrived at Tugaw's Cabin where we took a break for lunch. After lunch we started out heading towards the Fuller Pasture area (142). With full bellies and anticipation to what lay ahead, it was not long before we encountered our first and only obstacles of the day. On a slightly muddy steep hillside we had to remove five trees that completely blocked our way. Up for the task everyone pitched in and we made quick work in clearing the way. It was unanimous, we all had too many layers of clothing on for such work. We rode to Sawmill Flats (528, 147) and made a stop at the Cabin near Terrell's Corral Creek. adventure came as we took off on the Cave Canyon Trail (812). This is the first 50-inch trail of the day. It was in good shape, with some off-camber and rocky sections as usual. We stopped at the North Cottonwood Vista Point to take in the views of Mount Harrison and Cache Peak. We continued our

ride down Cave Canyon and turned left onto Robbers Peak Trail (801, 082) going past Mud Springs.

We rode to the Big Cedar Road (528) where we turned left. As we neared Buckhorn Road, we made a quick right turn onto North Franks Canyon Road (072) and onto Robbers Gulch jeep trail (079). It was a welcomed relief to see the work at the hazardous boulder. This greatly improved the safety of the ride. We took a break upon arriving at Buckhorn Road. Everyone was in good spirits and elected to ride the East Plateau going back to the vehicles. We rode up Buckhorn Road (529) and upon arriving at the top turned right onto 524). We now left the USFS managed lands and started our final trek across BLM managed lands. The sad part of riding BLM areas it that many of the roads and trails do not have numbers. Unless there is stream or mountain peak associated with these routes it is hard to describe the routes. We rode across the high plateau which offered great views of the Mini-Cassia and Magic Valleys. Due to the incoming storms and inversion, views of the Smokey and Boulder Mountains were mere silhouettes to the north. After making the steep decent to the valley floor we rode back to our vehicles. Yes, we did encounter dust on this trip. The ride was 57 miles long and got cooler towards the end, especially in the shadowy areas. It was a great time with all the great riders. We got to see lots of wildlife and views of the surrounding area.



### Trail Difficulty Guide

evel 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

**Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate:** Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center obstacles. Four-wheel on drive highly recommended.

Level 5 - Expert: high camber, water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.

- Generator should be with use consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.
- 4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.
