## Arco - Sunday Ride Report

## Big Southern Butte

a.k.a. "Riding through the big ugly to get to the top" (Linda Laudert's title)


On Sunday June 21, 2020 (Father's Day) 3 ATV's and 4 side by sides took off from their campsite in Arco, Idaho at about 9:20 a.m. They made the long ride through the dusty desert to a famous Idaho Landmark known as Big Southern Butte, or sometimes just the Big Butte. Only one thing slowed the riders down as they followed the path proposed by ride leader Aaron Larson. They crossed a cattle guard and saw a small yellow sign which read, "Road Closed Except for Authorized Personnel." Since the riders had no authorization from anyone but themselves, they opted to take an alternate route. Upon further review, Aaron discovered that the sign was posted at the edge of Department of Energy property. Therefore, the riders made a wise decision and avoided any incidents with INL security teams or black helicopters!


The riders continued on their way and eventually arrived at the base of the large landmark at 11:14 a.m. A sign there read, "Big Butte National Natural Landmark," and, among other things, said "The butte has been registered as a National Natural Landmark. To help assure preservation of its significant geological and other natural resource values, vehicles must stay on designated roads."

According to the book Geology Underfoot in Southern Idaho by CSI Geology Professor Shawn Willsey, (a read highly recommended by the author of this article) Big Southern Butte is a lava dome formed approximately 300,000 years ago when "an intrusion of rhyolitic magma pushed its way upward through basalt flows" of the Snake River Plain. "As the extrusion of rhyolitic lava continued, the lava dome grew wider, taller, and steeper and its flank periodically collapsed." Today, Big Southern Butte rises " 2400 feet above the desolate plain and has a diameter of about 4 miles." According to calculations made by the author of this article using the equation for the circumference of a circle- $2 \pi r$-it is about 12 miles around the base of Big Southern Butte!

That's it for the science, now back to the ride report...The riders embarked on the sometimes steep, and often rocky, climb to the top of Big Southern Butte. Beautiful wildflowers and green desert plants covered the steep slopes. The bluepurple penstemon and lupine were especially attractive. The road soon reached a saddle in the mid-section of the butte and the group took the right fork in the road first. More climbing took them to the southwestern side of the butte-a lookout from which hang gliders occasionally launch. The sign on the butte said, "Attention Hang Glider Pilots: Big Southern Butte is an advanced and potentially hazardous hang-gliding site. Know your capabilities, existing weather conditions, and play it safe." Surprisingly, not a single rider mentioned anything
about wanting to go hang gliding off Big Southern Butte in the future.


The riders were, however, interested in lunch! They found a nice spot in the sun where they were sheltered from the wind by some trees. They enjoyed lunch there along with a brief geology lesson about the butte (just like in this article). After lunch, most riders drove to the summit of Big Southern Butte where the trail ended at a small parking area with a low rock wall \& a rock fireplace! The riders walked around enjoying the view and taking photos. They even used the timer on Aaron Larson's iPhone to take a group picture! And, it only took 2 tries to get it to work!


The riders continued to enjoy the scenery as they slowly descended from the giant lava dome. According to Geology Underfoot in Southern Idaho, "The instability of their overly steep slopes and repeated collapses tend to keep the height of lava domes in check. They seldom exceed 1,500 feet. The tremendous height and girth of Big Southern Butte make it a rarity." (Oops, just slipped in a little more science there, sorry ().) After reaching the bottom of the butte, on the north side, the riders took a right and drove clockwise about three
quarters of the way around the butte. Then they took off on the desert roads and headed for Arco.
Sightings on the desert portion of the ride included 4 antelopes, including one that almost took out ATV rider Ted McNeil! (You will have to talk to him for details.) The riders also observed A LOT of bovine wildlife (a.k.a. cows) watering stations, a large study area surrounded by electric fence, dust, wind, and wildflowers. The riders pulled into their campsite at 3:21 p.m. Total miles for the ride: 86.7 miles. The general opinion was that the 'on the butte' portion of the ride was fabulous, but the desert portion wasn't as great, and it was a bit long. Maybe next time we visit the awe-inspiring Big Southern Butte, we will start the ride in Atomic City instead of Arco.

That evening we hung out and had an enjoyable evening. We also helped rescue a family. Their truck decided to leak all the ATF fluid out right at the FS Flats junction. Kent pulled their truck into camp, and then went and got their trailer and pulled it into camp for them.

## Trail Difficulty Guide

Level 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate: Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center on obstacles. Four-wheel drive highly recommended.

Level 5 - Expert: Very rocky, steep, off camber, high water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.


## Club Rules

The Magic Valley ATV Riders (MVATVR), Inc. would appreciate you being considerate of others and observing the following rules/guidelines while participating in club activities. Obviously, any actions that are unlawful or unsafe are prohibited.

1. Pets should be kept on a leash of no longer than 6 feet during any rides, campouts or other MVATVR events. Please be a responsible pet owner and respect the rights of others.
2. Idaho State Law states that being under the influence and/or consuming alcohol or illegal drugs while operating an OHV is illegal and therefore will not be tolerated by MVATVR, Inc.
3. Generator use should be with consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.
4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.
