YE 100 Ride Report

This year's ride was again changed so it would be available to more club members wishing to participate only for the day. We were considering various routes in the Jarbidge area but decided the distance to drive, the length and time for the ride, and extremely dry conditions would have been difficult for those making the long drive home the same day. So, we decided to make the ride from F.S. Flats to the City of Rocks near Almo.

The Weather was perfect with a light breeze and clear sky. As you can imagine, our morning routes and late afternoon routes would take us directly into the sun most of the time. Though annoying, it was manageable. It was nice to have

winding trails, and it was great when the sun finally was high in the sky. Well, I must be truthful, or Aaron will be all over this, we did have one of the greatest interactions with DUST not seen since we did the Minidoka Camp and Dietrich Ride several years ago. Yup, dust clouds formed with the lead riders and lasted until the last rider arrived at our breaks. 

Speaking of last riders, we did lose one rider at the start. Lessons learned, have a person to lead wider machines around the bypass routes. It is very important to have communications set up for long club rides with lots of members. Communications between the ride leader and the tail gunner is very important for participant and ride safety.

We rallied next to our favorite staging area at F.S. This year, some folks found it necessary to drop off trailers and fifth wheels at the larger camping area. After a quick safety briefing, we headed out, following a series of trails in the F.S. Flats area and onto Piney Cabin. On our way a moose family graced their presence and slowed us to a stop. They strolled down the road ahead of us which allowed many of the riders the opportunity to see them.

After our break at Piney Cabin, we headed down into Trout Creek then rode the rolling hills past Trout Creek Pass, Trout Creek Mountain, Willow Creek Peak, and Joe's Mountain. Just before we reached Beaver Dam Pass, Rob Hendrickson decided to try his hand at repairing a sidewall tear on his new driver side rear tire. After several plugs and air still leaking, it was time for him to plead for a spare tire from someone. Gary Aufderheide graciously gave up his spare and the tire was changed at 7000 foot elevation. I think Jeanette Graham gave us a 1 out of 10 for pit crew efficiency, only because she felt sorry for us. Once the tire was replaced, we were on our way.

We traveled to Beaver Dam Pass and down into the Beaver Dam Basin area. We got to endure the floury dust going over Dave's Pass. We followed Coal Banks Creek to Goose Creek. The water crossing was very light due to the drought conditions we're experiencing. This was a great place for lunch.

After lunch, two machines with four riders parted our group as they did not want to do a 100 plus mile ride. The remainder of the group headed up Devine Canyon and over Granite Pass. We stopped for a short break at the California Trail Historical marker. We then dropped into the valley heading to the City of Rocks National Reserve. As we left the private land, we stopped briefly to bunch up so we would pass through the gate as a group. While waiting, Kent got out of his RZR and spoke with one of ranchers who were sorting and loading cattle at this location. Once we were gathered up, we proceeded through the gate onto the City of Rocks.

There were several visitors from all over in the reserve area. Many could be seen climbing the massive granite formations and several folks watching. We rode past the Twin Sisters, Bath Rock, and Bread Loaf, only to name a few. We then made our way north through Almo Park and turned down Fish Creek Road. When we arrived at Birch Creek Road, we grouped up again for our trek to Oakley.

In Oakley several riders fueled up and some even took advantage of the cold drinks, ice cream, and snacks at Farmers Corner. This was a welcome intermission to our ride. With fuel tanks and bellies full we headed to camp. We followed the main road west out of Oakley and up the 500 Road (Bostetter Road). As we approached the Hudson Ridge area, we were given a rare sight. A persistent Dust Devil was spinning in the burn area not 100 feet from the road. The unique thing about this Dust Devil was that the tail was only slightly moving at the base but stayed in the approximate same spot. It was so heavy and brown looking it appeared to attach itself to the sun.

Well, the day was filled with vast colors, and sights. The dust made it so riders had to space out as best they could to avoid being blinded. After the days ride it was apparent the fall colors were coming to an end. We rode between 104 and 110 miles and enjoyed everyone's company.

Trail Difficulty Guide

Level 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate: Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center on obstacles. Four-wheel drive highly recommended.

Level 5 - Expert: Very rocky, steep, off camber, high water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.



Club Rules

The Magic Valley ATV Riders (MVATVR), Inc. would appreciate you being considerate of others and observing the following rules/guidelines while participating in club activities. Obviously, any actions that are unlawful or unsafe are prohibited.



1. Pets should be kept on a leash of no longer than 6 feet during any rides, campouts or other MVATVR events. Please be a responsible pet owner and respect the rights of others.

2. Idaho State Law states that being under the influence and/or consuming alcohol or illegal drugs while operating an OHV is illegal and therefore will not be tolerated by MVATVR, Inc.

3. Generator use should be with consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.

4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.

I / We have carefully read this agreement and the release of liability and fully understand its contents. I / We are aware that this release of liability is a contract between Magic Valley ATV Riders, Inc. (and its club members) and myself / us and I / we sign it of my / our own free will. My / our signature signifies that I / we have read and agree with this release.

The above and foregoing shall also apply to any minor child of mine accompanying me or participating in the events and activities above-described.
