#### **Forest Service Information**

Two weeks ago I met with Jed to talk about how we could help the Forest Service. Here are some highlights.

The trail cat will be in the Minidoka Ranger District from October 19th to the 26th. Some trail work will take place in Sublett, Albion, and in the Cassia Divisions. In the Cassia Division, our first priority is getting the 849\Bear Gulch West trail fixed since it is the worst trail in the division. They would like someone to go and be with the trail cat operator on as many of the days as possible. The work is easy. As the operator works on the trail, you just need to move his RZR from where he left it to wherever he is working so he doesn't have to go back and forth. You also just need to be in the area so you can trim the occasional branch or things like that so he can spend more time on the trail cat moving dirt. If you wish to help, please contact Gary via phone or email.

On Public Lands Day the forest service trails crew assisted the motorcycle club with building foundations for two bridges to replace the ones burned at the bottom of Third Fork. Later this month a helicopter will be flying in the beams and other parts so the Forest Service trails crew can finish the bridges before winter weather hits.

They have five gates that they acquired from someplace up in the Sun Valley area. They also have a skid steer and attachments scheduled for the first of November. If the weather cooperates, they will get the gates installed in the Porcupine area (we hope) and get that area locked up so the bigger machines will stay out (we saw a 72" four seater on one of the Porcupine trails last Sunday).

They are also going to try and get some grants written that will allow us to put in ATV crossovers on the Kirkham trails in the next year or so.

## **Public Lands Day Report**

On Tuesday, September 20<sup>th</sup>, club members secured the large group site at FS Flats. Through the week those that camped spent time riding.

Friday morning as we all prepared to go riding, a cow moose and her youngster walked through camp which meant the day was going to be good.

We broke into two groups. One went riding, and one went to look at things in preparation for Saturdays work detail. Those that went on the "official business" ride explored the Porcupine trail system between Pike Mountain, Porcupine Campground, and on up to the top of Martindale to see where we needed to suggest to the Forest Service to install gates and to determine which trails needed maintenance.

That evening upon the return of both groups, an impromptu potluck dinner was held, and we had a good time hanging out around the campfire. Aaron broke out the drone he has on extended loan and got some nice looking photos of the camp!



Saturday morning rolled around, and we had a brief meeting and headed out to our respective work areas.



One group started at Diamond Field Jack parking lot. They trimmed up to trail 239, then up to Pike Mtn. Trail (241). They worked our way down 241, fixing an off-camber spot with Pulaski and shovel. At trail 163, they met with other club members and proceeded back to camp.

One group spent the day on 004\Third Fork and brushed the trail and did some other minor trail maintenance.

One group went down 015\Trout Creek and did quite a bit of brushwork since the quaking aspen trees are growing in nice and thick and also did some dirt work on the trail.

Another group of "older folks" as they referred to themselves, rode the entire length of 920\Telephone Canyon and trimmed anything that caused obstructed views going around the corners.

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The final group brushed out 911\Blind Creek and then headed down onto 865\Goose Creek where they worked on issues related to water on the trail. In addition to the beavers that are flooding the trail, there are a number of springs on the uphill side of the trail. Some drainage channels were dug where water was collecting on the trail to keep the water from pooling.



The first crews started coming back in around 12:30 p.m. and once all four crews were in, everyone enjoyed a nice baked potato lunch!

After lunch, several short rides took place and that evening another potluck was organized.



We think we had 22 folks participate and from the aerial photo, 13 campers were in attendance.

That evening a Sunday morning breakfast was organized. In the morning, Ron built a fire and everyone brought out all the food that they cooked. We had enough bacon, eggs, and fried potatoes to feed a small army.

# **New Forest Supervisor**

Intermountain Region Regional Forester Mary Farnsworth is pleased to announce she has selected Jake Strohmeyer as the Forest Supervisor for the Sawtooth National Forest.

Prior to his selection as Forest Supervisor, Strohmeyer served as the District Ranger for the Cascade Ranger District of the Boise National Forest, a position he held since 2016, where he was responsible for all aspects of management of the district's resources including an active forest health and hazardous fuels reduction program, rapidly growing recreation use, and fire management.

Strohmeyer started his career with the USDA Forest Service in 1994 as a firefighter on the Boise National Forest and went on to work in a variety of positions on the Idaho Panhandle, Nez Perce, and Salmon-Challis National Forests. Prior to becoming a District Ranger, he had been a staff officer for the Payette National Forest where he worked on a wide variety of projects and issues including collaborative travel planning, wilderness management, large scale mining exploration projects, and the Payette's Collaborative Forest Landscape Restoration Project.

Over the years, Strohmeyer has performed several temporary assignments such as Deputy Forest Supervisor, Deputy Chief of Staff for National Forest System in Washington D.C., and Bipartisan

Infrastructure Law Coordinator for the Intermountain Region.

Strohmeyer said, "I am honored to be entrusted with the responsibility for managing the Sawtooth National Forest and I am looking forward to getting to know our partners, state agency personnel, congressional legislators, county and city representatives, and communities that use and enjoy the Forest."

#### Sagebrush Planting

Volunteers are needed to help plant 20,000 sagebrush seedlings.

Fall is right around the corner which traditionally brings cooler temperatures and fall rain, making it the perfect time to plant sagebrush to restore big game winter range lost during the Badger Fire. The Sawtooth National Forest, Minidoka Ranger District and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, Magic Valley Region have set a date of Saturday October 22, 2022 for a volunteer planting project in the area burned during the 2020 Badger Fire. The goal this year is to plant 20,000 sagebrush plants during this one-day event.

According to Scott Soletti, Minidoka district wildlife biologist "last year's planting project was a great success, with 110 volunteers participating and planting approximately 15,000 plants. Planting success was one of the best on record with over 90% survival on many of the planted sites. These projects result in improved big game and sage-grouse habitat on some really important winter range."

The planting site will be in the Dry Creek Area south of Hansen; the Forest Service and Fish and Game staff will meet volunteers at the bottom of the Dry Creek Road before heading up to the planting sites. Work gloves and planting tools will be provided. Volunteers should bring a lunch and water. Porta-potties will be provided at the planting sites as well. A map with directions is below.

First Lite, a locally based national outdoor wear manufacturer who is committed to conservation will be offering a \$200 gift certificate to one of the volunteers who helps plant sagebrush on October 22.

To sign up for this volunteer planting opportunity contact Alberti at (208) 324-4359 to ensure enough planting tools and materials are available on the day of the project.

## Trail Difficulty Guide

evel 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate: Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center obstacles. Four-wheel on drive highly recommended.

**Level 5 - Expert:** Very rocky, steep, off camber, high water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, need may winch.

- should be Generator use consideration for others in camp and recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.
- 4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.
