Juniper\Black Pine Report

The Juniper\Black Pine campout was a lot of fun! I arrived a day early with Bill Mefford to do some scouting before everyone else arrived.

On Wednesday, we arrived and set up camp and relaxed the rest of the day.

Thursday, we went to check out a road that I had looked at on Google Earth but knew from the topography that one section was going to be pretty steep. When we arrived, yes, it was steep, but after surveying things, up I went. After crawling to the top, I found that it was not a bad climb and everyone else came up next. At the top we found some good views and continued down the trail. At the end of this road, we did a bit more exploring and then turned around and back tracked back to camp. Our trip took us forty-eight miles in just about three hours! As we were pulling back into camp, the Grahams were driving down the road. We directed them to camp and through the rest of the day more campers arrived. That evening we experienced rain showers off and on.

Friday, we started with seven machines and left a bit earlier than planned. Our seventy-six mile trip took us through some spectacular country. We had no dust in the morning and everything was green and lush. We climbed a short hill first thing in the morning and could see the Black Pine mine and mountain range from here. We then continued our journey and discovered that the county had

graveled one of the roads and it was in really good shape!

We were ahead of schedule and when we got to the 50" trail, Buck and Dianne separated from us since they had a big machine, and they went off to explore on their own. Our route took us up a really beautiful trail system that gave us good views of the eastern mountain ranges. We took a dead end road and had lunch and then continued our travels.



When we got to the Sublet guard station, the weather was not looking good so we skipped some of the planned ride and headed back to camp wearing our rain gear.

Saturday morning our seventy-five mile trip had ten machines in attendance. We took the route up the steep mountain that we scouted earlier in the week and everyone did great on the climb. We enjoyed the sights and then headed down into the desert area.



We travelled on one grassy road, and then onto the dusty area. We had to traverse a few areas of steep roads, and a washed out section that everyone made it through. After a stop to look at the water tank, Jacob's front shock blew out and the rest of his day was very bouncy! We then made another stop at the top to look down into Holbrook, the clouds were gathering so we again donned rain gear and drove quickly to our lunch spot. We got dripped on but did enjoy lunch without getting wet.

On our way back, we were traveling at a quick pace to beat the weather. At one intersection, we gathered up and split into two groups. One group headed back to camp via a short cut, and the other group led by me took the long cut since we were going to risk getting rained on.

My group continued and did a bit more riding and did a bit of the reverse of the preceding

days morning ride. We could see the clouds again gathering at the top, so back we went.

Now, upon arrival at camp, we found that the group that broke off to avoid the rain got completely drenched and my group arrived very dry

Sunday morning we took off to explore the Black Pine mountains. As we headed up, with six machines on our sixty one mile loop, we went up two roads that can only be described as being rain forest like – there was so much green and wet! After exploring these two dead end roads, we started the climb up Black Pine from the northern side. As we did the climb, we found fresh mining exploring activity.



When we arrived at the top we took some time to look around, and then made a short loop down and back up to our lunch spot, and then back down the southern portion of the mountain that gets into the desert.

As we continued back north to the mine, we found several crews of folks gathering grass and sagebrush seed!

As we came to the various mines and looked around, we were amazed at the size of the pits they had dug. Our trip was cut short with black clouds rolling over the mountain so we high-tailed it back to camp and didn't get wet.



Upon arrival, with the impending weather forecast, we all packed up and headed home with the exception of Buck and Dianne.

That evening from home, Mt. Harrison had one heck of a storm and we had about an inch of rain at my house.

South Hills Work Report

Saturday, June 17th was our day in the South Hills. Thanks to those who arrived earlier in the week and secured the big camping spot at FS Flats!

On Thursday, the day I arrived, those that had arrived earlier in the week were off riding. After getting set up, Kris, Bill, and myself went out on a short nineteen mile long ride. We found that a big drift was blocking the top of 256\Port Spring where it ties into the top of Deadline Ridge. After back tracking a bit, we dropped down into Goose Creek and found that the beavers had been back to work on their dams by the bridge. After a little bit of dam deconstruction, we continued on our way and found everyone back to camp.

On Friday morning, we again broke into several groups. My group did a thirty-nine mile route that took us through Porcupine, Martindale, the area around Father and Son and Bostetter campground. We then took the jeep trail to bypass the big drift on Trapper Creek. Dixie got stuck and had to be winched out after high centering on a snow drift. We then went to look at the washout on the lower end of Trout Creek trail. Just past the water trough, yes, the trail is washed out. After talking to the Forest Service last week, we have a way to bypass it. Sometime in the next week or two, we will get a bunch of folks together and go down and get it fixed.

That evening on the way back from making some phone calls, we passed a brand new truck and brand new camper going where they shouldn't be going. We stopped and talked to the driver and told him that the road going farther was not good and they should turn back and come camp with us, and they did.

Saturday morning we gathered at 8:30 and broke into groups and headed out to work on the trails. All told, we brushed out twenty-eight miles of trails during approximate 120 hours . We worked on Little Fork, Third Fork, Martindale, Telephone Canyon, FS Overlook, and a few other trails in that area.

Some highlights of the work include removing a whole bunch of trees that fell down and were blocking the FS Overlook trail, fixing some creek crossings that had torn out some trails,

cleaning up some blind curves, and lots and lots of branches that were trimmed to make the trails wider.

At about 1:00 p.m., most of the groups had either returned or were in the process of returning. At 1:30 p.m. we had lunch consisting of Chili Verde and the trimmings. Thanks to those that prepared the meal.

That afternoon, various groups went on several short rides, and some chose to sit at camp in their chairs and rest from the day's work.

Sunday morning we all got up and gathered at the fire and shared a hearty breakfast together. We finished off the leftover Chili Verde, as well as all the eggs, bacon, and everything else that was brought.

Due to the weather not looking good after breakfast, most of us packed up camp and headed home after cleaning up.

A few other highlights. Every night we enjoyed everyone's company around the various campfires. We helped out the folks that were new to camping and assisted in figuring out their water heater and gave them tons of pointers.

Thanks again to everyone that came and assisted in any way this weekend.

Mackay Campout and Ride – Big Update!

The Mackay Campout and Ride will be held at the Mackay Tourist Park on July 27th through August 1st, 2023.

Directions to the Mackay Tourist Park:

Turn Southwest on Capital Ave. Continue 6 blocks and turn Northwest on Vaden Street. Park is straight ahead.

Check in is *after* 10 am on Thursday July 27th! (Please do not show up before 10 am) Check out is before 10 am Tuesday August 1st.

The Park is dry camping only and the cost will be about \$10 per site for the entire event. You can pay me at the campout.

Please review the rules and look at the park map to understand how the RV spaces are arranged. Some of the rules to pay attention to are: clean up after pets, pets must be on a leash, don't leave pets unattended, don't park on the grass if you are in sites 16-24, and follow the one way signs when entering or leaving the park.

The older section of the park has 15 spaces and trees. Trees may drip on your RV's, vehicles, and ATV's. Sites vary in size so please pick a spot appropriate for the size of your RV. Spaces 16-24 are gravel pads with grass in between sites.

As of now, we have a few sites open. You can call or text Ron Mothershead at 208-731-4404 to save a spot.

Trail Difficulty Guide

Level 1 - Beginner: Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2 - Advanced Beginner: Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3 - Intermediate: Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4 - Advanced Intermediate: Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center on obstacles. Four-wheel drive highly recommended.

- 3. Generator use should be with consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.
- 4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.
